2. Approval of the May 18, 2020 Meeting Summary Vice Chair Julia Cleary

The Vice Chair requested revisions or comments on the meeting summary from the May 18, 2020 meeting from the Committee.

3. Discussion on Federal Transit Administration (FTA) 5310 Grant Program Criteria

......Mr. Ryan Collins, CAMPO

Mr. Ryan Collins, Short-Range Planning Manager provided a brief overview of the FTA 5310 Grant Program criteria. Mr. Collins informed the Committee that the FTA 5310 Grant is completed in the fall annually. Mr. Collins reported that approximately \$1 million is allocated to nonprofits and government agencies to provide transportation services in areas when transportation services are unavailable, insufficient, or inappropriate to meeting those needs. In 2012, CAMPO designated Capital Metro as the designated recipient of FTA 5310 funds and the responsibility of project selection remaining with CAMPO. Mr. Collins also reported that the Transportation Policy Board requested that CAMPO revisit the FTA 5310 Grant Program criteria in hopes of it improving it.

Mr. Collins briefly highlighted and discussed elements of the FTA 5310 Grant Program scoring criteria and requested that the Committee provide comments on the criteria by the end of the week. Mr. Collins added that any feedback received will be incorporated into the criteria. Question and answer with discussion followed.

Mr. Ryan Collins informed the Committee that CAMPO staff is in the middle of the fall amendment cycle. Mr. Collins reported that amendment cycles are held annually in the spring and fall. Mr. Collins noted that out of cycle amendment requests are also processed.

Mr. Collins also informed the Committee that six (6) amendment requests were received from Hays County for the RTP of which is currently in review and processing. Mr. Collins added that no amendment requests were received for the TIP. Mr. Collins later highlighted and discussed the schedule and public outreach for the fall amendment cycle. Question and answer with comments followed.

5. Presentation on Benefits of A Potential Open Roads Policy for the CAMPO Region

......Mr. Tom Fowler, Kimley-Horn & Associates

Mr. Tom Fowler of Kimley Horn & Associates informed the Committee that Kimley Horn & Associates is working with the TxDOT - Austin District and CAMPO on a joint project looking to implement some of the recommendations from the 2018 CAMPO Regional Incident Management Strategic Plan, approved by the Transportation Policy Board in December of 2018. Mr. Fowler highlighted and briefly discussed those recommendations and noted that the Open Roads Policy was identified as one of the recommendations targeted for implementation and also presented to the Transportation Policy Board as an information item on August 10, 2020. Mr. Fowler noted that the Open Roads Policy formalizes the commitment of the region to opening roads as quickly and safely as possible. Mr. Fowler later provided a detailed overview of the draft Open Roads Policy for the CAMPO region. Question and answer with comments followed.

The Chair recognized Mr. Ryan Collins, Short-Range Planning Manager who informed the Board that transit providers that directly receive Section 5307 funding are required to adopt a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with regards to the metropolitan transportation planning and programming process. Mr. Collins added that CAMPO currently has an MOU in place with Capital Metro. Mr. Collins reported that a standard MOU has been developed now that the City of Round Rock has become a direct recipient of Section 5307 funding and begun transit operations. Mr. Collins noted that it is a joint MOU between CAMPO, the City of Round Rock and TxDOT and briefly highlighted the terms of the document as included in the meeting materials.

11. Presentation on Benefits of a Potential Open Roads Policy for the CAMPO Region

The Chair recognized Mr. Tom Fowler of Kimley Horn & Associates who provided a brief overview of the Benefits of a Potential Open Roads Policy for the CAMPO Region. Mr. Fowler informed the Board that Kimley Horn & Associates is working with CAMPO and the TxDOT – Austin District to implement some of the recommendations that came out of CAMPO's 2018 Regional Incident Management Strategic Plan. Mr. Fowler added that only 6 (six) of the recommendations were targeted for implementation of which the development of an Open Roads Policy to better facilitate traffic incident management became a focus. Mr. Fowler later provided a brief overview of the draft policy and summarized its benefits.

The Chair offered comments regarding her experience with the City of Austin's Police Department timely incident management process.

Mr. Ashby Johnson, CAMPO Executive Director informed the Board that the draft Open Roads Policy will be presented to the TAC for recommendation and later to the Transportation Policy Board for approval. Mr. Johnson added that the draft policy will serve as a precursor to the work on the IH-35 Project.

Mr. Ashby Johnson provided an update on the current status of the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, federal transportation bill and briefly discussed a potential transportation stimulus bill anticipated for March 2021. Mr. Johnson also highlighted CAMPO's upcoming fall planning activities.

Mr. Chad McKeown later provided a brief overview of TxDOT's Unified Transportation Program (UTP). Mr. McKeown reported that CAMPO staff has been requested to review the draft 2021 UTP to ensure that the IH-35 Capital Express Project was fully funded. Mr. McKeown confirmed that the remaining funding delta of \$301 million has been included in the 2021 UTP as Category 12 Strategic Priority funds. Mr. McKeown also reported that the Texas Transportation Commission is scheduled to consider adoption of the 2021 UTP at its August 27, 2020 meeting.

RECOMMENDATION

CAMPO staff recommends the Transportation Policy Board approve the FY 2020 & 2021 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) Amendment Three with its accompanying resolution (Attachment A).

PURPOSE AND EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The purpose of this item is to carryover unexpended funds from FY 2020 to FY 2021, to add additional funding to the Regional Transit Coordination, and to add the City of Round Rock's Transit Master Plan Update as required by federal regulation.

On August 31, 2020, CAMPO was awarded approximately \$95,000 in federal funds under the Section 5304 Grant Program to prepare a new 5-year comprehensive public transit-human services transportation plan. MPOs across Texas receive these grants from TxDOT – Public Transportation Division to develop these plans that were started at the request of former Texas Transportation Commissioner Esperanza "Hope" Andrade.

On September 9, 2020, CAMPO received a request from the City of Round Rock to add their Transit Master Plan Update to the UPWP per federal regulation. Funding includes Federal Transit Administration 5307 Grant funds received by the City of Round Rock in the amount of \$200,000 and \$50,000 local funds.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

Amendment Three will increase the FY 2020 & 2021 UPWP (Attachment B) by the amount of \$3,413,720.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

The UPWP is the federally-required document that identifies work tasks to be completed in the CAMPO region. The proposed Amendment Three to the FY 2020 & 2021 UPWP is detailed as follows:

- INTRODUCTION The Federal Aid Highway Act of 1962 promulgated the requirement that all urban areas of 50,000 or more population develop and maintain a comprehensive, cooperative, and continuing (3-C) transportation planning process. The process would establish a transportation plan and provide the procedure by which it would be maintained and revised on a continuing basis.
 - A. **PURPOSE** The Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) provides descriptive details for the Capital Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (CAMPO) planning process for FYs 2020- 2021. This activity is required under federal law defining the responsibilities of Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPO). The UPWP serves as the document for identifying ways to carry out the continuing, cooperative and comprehensive transportation planning process in the six-county Capital Area in Central Texas. An MPO is required to perform all planning tasks set forth in federal laws and regulations, many of which are conducted annually. However, some tasks require more than one year to complete and are carried forward from one UPWP to the next. To effectively identify all work tasks, CAMPO prepares this UPWP with input from federal, state and local jurisdictions and transportation providers in the CAMPO region.

FAST Act Planning Factors

FAST Act contains ten broad planning areas that should be considered when developing plans and programs. The work tasks contained in the FYs 2020 - 2021 UPWP have considered the following ten areas, some more directly than others:

- 1. Support the economic vitality of the metropolitan area, especially by enabling global competitiveness, productivity, and efficiency;
- Increase the safety of the transportation system for motorized and nonmotorized users;
- Increase the security of the transportation system for motorized and nonmotorized users;
- 4. Increase accessibility and mobility of people and freight;
- Protect and enhance the environment, promote energy conservation, improve the quality of life, and promote consistency between transportation improvements and State and local planned growth and economic development patterns;
- 6. Enhance the integration and connectivity of the transportation system, across and between modes, for people and freight;
- 7. Promote efficient system management and operation;
- 8. Emphasize the preservation of the existing transportation system;
- 9. Improve the resiliency and reliability of the transportation system and reduce or mitigate storm water impacts of surface transportation; and
- 10. Enhance travel and tourism.

Further, the work tasks consider the federal performance goals in the following seven areas:

- 1. Safety
- 2. Infrastructure Condition
- 3. Congestion Reduction
- 4. System Reliability
- 5. Freight Movement and Economic Vitality
- 6. Environmental Sustainability
- 7. Reduced Project Delivery Delays
- B. DEFINITION OF AREA The CAMPO planning area includes all of Bastrop, Burnet, Caldwell, Hays, Travis and Williamson Counties (Appendix B) and the cities and villages in each of the six counties (a comprehensive list of these jurisdictions can be found at www.campotexas.org). By federal definition, CAMPO's planning area must at least include the urbanized area (as defined by the U.S. Bureau of the Census) and the contiguous area that may reasonably be expected to become urbanized in the next 20 years.

During the 2010 census, a very small portion of Guadalupe County was included as a part of the newly urbanized area of San Marcos. San Marcos intends to remain part of CAMPO. Therefore, an agreement was developed between CAMPO and the Alamo Area MPO (AAMPO) regarding the roles and responsibilities of each MPO concerning this portion of Guadalupe County. CAMPO agrees that staff will meet as needed to review progress of planning efforts to discuss key findings from program activities and to discuss the scope, plans, and implementation of activities. To help ensure continuity of federal and state funds, CAMPO agrees to abide by the methodology and process used to allocate funds to the respective MPOs. CAMPO agrees to abide by the methodology and process currently used to allocate federal transportation planning funds to the respective MPOs. CAMPO agrees to work with the AAMPO to identify the need for corridor projects that cross the CAMPO and AAMPO planning area boundary.

C. ORGANIZATION – The <u>Transportation Policy Board</u> (Appendix A), provides policy direction for CAMPO. The Policy Board consists of 20 elected and appointed county, city, Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and Capital Metropolitan Transportation Authority (CMTA) officials.

The Policy Board also has several committees for which the CAMPO staff provides administrative support and technical assistance. Some of these committees have members who do not currently serve on the Policy Board but who represent stakeholders in the community:

 <u>The Technical Advisory Committee</u> (TAC) the committee's purpose is to advise the Transportation Policy Board in its development of the long-range metropolitan transportation plan; the Transportation Improvement Program, including review of and recommendations on candidate projects for the TIP; the Unified Planning Work Program; and other transportation planning activities, as directed by the Transportation Policy Board or CAMPO's Executive Director.

- <u>The Executive Committee</u> are members of the Transportation Policy Board who make recommendations on transportation planning issues, projects and the process as directed by the Transportation Policy Board.
- <u>The Finance Committee</u> was formed to become fully educated and explore long-term financing options for potential modal components of a comprehensive transportation system.
- <u>The Transit Working Group</u> (TWG) was formed to analyze and evaluate the potential for high capacity transit in Central Texas, and the optimal role for transit as part of the comprehensive regional transportation plan.
- <u>The Budget, Audit and Finance Committee</u> was formed to review and make recommendations to the Transportation Policy Board for the CAMPO annual planning budget.
- <u>The SH 45 (SW) Committee</u> was formed to analyze options for the future development of SH 45(SW) and address issues surrounding the further planning of the corridor.

Other committees, task forces or study groups may be formed from time-to-time throughout the year as necessary.

CAMPO currently operates with various professional staff positions. The professional staff covers the tasks listed in the UPWP. Depending on the budget and/or work tasks to be completed, CAMPO may employ a varying number of consultants, interns, permanent, or temporary personnel.

Functional Responsibilities of Planning Agencies

For the transportation planning process to function properly, the agencies involved must work together cooperatively. The Transportation Policy Board (TPB), the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), Central Texas Regional Mobility Authority (CTRMA), Capital Metro, Capital Area Rural Transportation System (CARTS) and the local governments within the planning area are responsible for carrying out the urban transportation planning process consistent with local agreements. This process includes planning for roadways, bicycling facilities, pedestrian facilities, freight movement, passenger rail, and transit.

The following descriptions of functional responsibilities for each agency are not intended to limit the participation of any agency or local government in the study. Rather, they are brief descriptions of primary responsibilities.

<u>Metropolitan Planning Organization</u> - The MPO, in cooperation with CTRMA, mass transit operators, planning agencies and local governments:

- 1) Is responsible for carrying out and maintaining the urban transportation planning process to include:
 - a. Cooperative decision-making, principally, by elected officials of local governments.
 - b. Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP),
 - c. Transportation Improvement Program (TIP),
 - d. Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP), and

- e. Congestion Management Process (CMP).
- 2) Executes contracts and/or agreements necessary to carry out the work outlined in the UPWP.
- 3) Develops and maintains transportation databases and analytical tools.

MPO staff has the following general responsibilities:

- 1) Provide staff support to the Transportation Policy Board (TPB), the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC), and committees of the Policy Board and TAC;
- 2) Review and report on items on the agenda(s) for the TPB, TAC, and appropriate committees;
- 3) Coordinate and perform the planning and data collection activities contained in the UPWP;
- 4) Prepare and submit an annual budget outlined in the UPWP for approval;
- 5) Receive and review all bills from consultants that the MPO has contracted with to perform work outlined in the UPWP;
- 6) Submit requests for reimbursement to the appropriate federal and/or state agencies for work performed according to the UPWP;
- 7) Prepare and submit grant applications for federal/other assistance in transportation planning, and related fields, as appropriate;
- 8) Prepare and submit the annual performance and expenditure report and annual project listing;
- 9) Coordinate the activities for the development and maintenance of the Unified Planning Work Program, the long-range Metropolitan Transportation Plan and the Transportation Improvement Program;
- 10) Refine and maintain a process for engaging the public in the transportation planning process; and
- 11) Perform any other administrative duties as required by the Transportation Policy Board; and,
- 12) Ensure compliance with Title VI Civil Rights, Environmental Justice and other federal requirements related to CAMPO's operations, activities and programs.

Texas Department of Transportation

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), within the realm of transportation planning, has the following varied responsibilities for the CAMPO planning area:

- Highway planning;
- Participating and lead agency in appropriate transportation studies and environmental documents;
- Review of all FTA Section 5307, 5310 and Section 5311 capital grant applications that may involve state funding; and

In addition, TxDOT maintains certain transportation database files and forecasting models, and coordinates its planning efforts with the MPO through the UPWP.

Capital Area Rural Transportation System (CARTS)

CARTS is the rural public transportation provider for this region and has primary responsibility for rural transit planning and operations in the study area.

Capital Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Capital Metro)

Capital Metro is a provider of public transportation in the region. Capital Metro has primary responsibility for conducting various short and long-range transit studies, maintaining all transit data, and is responsible for transit planning and operation in the urban portion of the study area.

Counties

Williamson County acts as our fiscal agent and provides support for human resources, benefits, accounting, and information technology.

The Counties of Bastrop, Burnet, Caldwell, Hays, Travis and Williamson have the primary responsibility for the planning of all roads outside incorporated areas that are not on the State system. This is done cooperatively with the State. The County coordinates its planning with TxDOT and incorporated areas in extraterritorial jurisdictional areas.

Cities

All jurisdiction cities in our planning area have the responsibility for the planning of all roads within their incorporated area not on the state system, and some have negotiated agreements with TxDOT to plan for roads on the state system as well in cooperation with TxDOT.

Public/Public and Public/Private Partnerships

Over the last few years, the CAMPO region continues partnerships with TxDOT, CARTS, CMTA, CAPCOG and its member jurisdictions and has actively pursued various partnerships with entities established to advance planning for and improve the area's transportation infrastructure. This includes partnerships with the area's Regional Mobility Authority (Central Texas Regional Mobility Authority).

- D. PRIVATE SECTOR INVOLVEMENT Consultants have been and will continue to be used on an as-needed basis in CAMPO's transportation programs and planning processes. In the past, CAMPO has used private sector consultants for a variety of services ranging from legal services to improvements to the regional travel demand model. These efforts will continue as well.
- E. PLANNING ISSUES AND EMPHASIS The Federal Highway Administration and Federal Transit Administration have jointly issued Planning Emphasis Areas (PEAs). The PEAs are planning topical areas for MPOs and State DOTs to develop and identify work tasks for FY 2020 and 2021. The Planning Emphasis Areas are:
 - MAP-21 Implementation Transition to Performance Planning and Programming: CAMPO continues to engage in performance-based planning and programming as required by MAP-21 and the FAST Act including the adoption of federal and state performance measures for Safety (PM1), Pavement/Bridge Conditions (PM2), System/Freight Performance (PM3) and Transit Asset Management (TAM). These performance measures are regularly updated, amended, and incorporated into the development of planning products including the Transportation Improvement Program and Regional Transportation Plan. Additionally, project programming and funding efforts undergo a rigorous performance-based evaluation process.

 Regional Models of Cooperation - Ensure a regional approach to transportation planning by promoting cooperation and coordination across transit agency, MPO and state boundaries:

CAMPO will continue to strive to improve the effectiveness of transportation decision making by working with regional partners to think beyond traditional borders and adopt a coordinated approach to transportation planning that supports common goals and capitalizes on opportunities related to project delivery, congestion management, safety, freight, livability, and commerce across boundaries. Improved multi-jurisdictional coordination promises to reduce project delivery time and enhance the efficient use of resources. Enhanced cross-jurisdictional communication will improve collaboration, policy implementation, technology usage, and performance management.

3. Ladders of Opportunity – Access to essential services:

Through the transportation planning process, CAMPO will work with regional partners to identify connectivity gaps in accessing essential services, including employment, health care, schools/education, and recreation. Staff will research analytical methods to identify gaps in the connectivity of the transportation system and identify infrastructure and operational solutions that provide the public, especially the traditionally underserved populations, with adequate access to essential services. Potential tasks include: evaluating the effectiveness of public transportation plans for engaging transportation disadvantaged communities in the transportation decision making process; updating the Section 5310 Coordinated Human Services Public Transportation Plan; assessing the safety and condition of pedestrian and bicycle facilities; and evaluating compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act, particularly around schools, concentrations of disadvantaged populations, social services, medical and transit facilities.

CAMPO will work cooperatively with TxDOT, CARTS and Capital Metropolitan Transportation Authority (CMTA) to define performance measures that emphasize these seven federal goals:

- 1. Safety
- 2. Infrastructure Condition
- 3. Congestion Reduction
- 4. System Reliability
- 5. Freight Movement and Economic Vitality
- 6. Environmental Sustainability
- 7. Reduced Project Delivery Delays

1.1.1 Program Administration: This activity includes development and implementation of those policies and guidelines necessary to carry out and maintain the transportation planning process; maintenance of the FY 2020 & 2021 Unified Planning Work Program, development of the Annual Performance and Expenditure Report (APER) and Annual Project Listing (APL), development of the FY 2022 & 2023 Unified Planning Work Program, sponsoring and conducting meetings including providing support to policy and advisory bodies; coordinating and working with other agencies and organizations involved in planning, programming and implementation of transportation projects.

1.1.2 <u>Public Participation</u>: This activity supports the implementation of the MPO's Public Participation Plan to include the conduct of community outreach and public meetings/hearings as needed with emphasis on Environmental Justice populations and the development/review processes of the Transportation Improvement Program, Metropolitan Transportation Plan and other planning products; develop and use of questionnaires, online surveys, newsletters and other participation techniques; and provide bilingual materials and translations as appropriate.

1.1.3 <u>Title VI Civil Rights/Environmental Justice (EJ)</u>: This activity supports monitoring and evaluating Title VI/EJ guidance and requirements, developing and implementing documents and procedures to ensure CAMPO's plans, programs and activities comply with Title VI/EJ guidance and requirements, collecting and analyzing data related to minority, low income, limited English proficiency and other populations vulnerable to potential disproportional adverse impacts from the planned transportation system and transportation projects, identifying possible strategies to minimize, avoid or mitigate potential disproportional adverse impacts on the EJ populations, maintaining, coordinating efforts to develop the Regional Toll Network Analysis that evaluates the impacts of the regional toll network on the EJ and non-EJ populations (see Task 2.0), implementing the CAMPO Limited English Proficiency Plan and updating that plan as needed.

PURPOSE AND EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Capital Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (CAMPO) manages the competitive project selection process for awarding federal FTA funding through the Section 5310 Program. This process awards approximately one million dollars to local non-profits and local governments annually. This program is administered by the Capital Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Capital Metro).

The Transportation Policy Board has requested that staff review the current project selection criteria, approved in 2012, and provide potential recommendations for updating the process and criteria. Staff has reviewed the current criteria, surveyed other 5310 grant programs, and compared the criteria to the FTA program goals, rules and regulations. Prior to drafting any potential updates to the criteria, staff has requested input from the Technical Advisory Committee. The current process, program rules and regulations, and additional information are provided in the attachments.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

The Federal Transit Administration Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities Section 5310 Program is intended to enhance mobility for seniors and persons with disabilities by providing funds for programs to serve the special needs of transit-dependent populations beyond traditional public transportation services and Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA) complementary paratransit services.

Capital Metro serves as the designated recipient of FTA Section 5310 funds in the Austin Urbanized Area and serves as the program administrator. Recipients of the grant funding are selected by the CAMPO through a competitive process. Selected applicants enter into a grant agreement with Capital Metro and become subrecipients for these funds. These grant agreements outline federal, state, and local requirements related to project administration and reporting and vary depending on the type of funding, project proposed, agency, and other factors.

The FTA Section 5310 Program is a reimbursable grant program, where the selected sub-recipients incur expenses and are reimbursed through the program at a rate of 80 percent for eligible traditional capital expenses and 50 percent for eligible other expenses such as operations until the federal award is exhausted. Because of this, sub-recipients must have sufficient funds available to incur program expenses.

PURPOSE AND EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Capital Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (CAMPO) manages the competitive project selection process for awarding Transportation Alternative Set-Aside (TASA) funding for the urbanized area of the CAMPO region. As part of this program, CAMPO is anticipating a Call for Projects in 2021 to allocate funding for Fiscal Years (FY) 2023-2026. A few important notes about the program:

- CAMPO is apportioned approximately \$2.5 million annually.
- TASA funds can lapse and are only available for obligation up to four years from the time of apportionment.
- TASA funds are primarily for smaller scale transportation projects and activities.
- The previous 2018 Project Call allocated nearly \$10 million in TASA funding for FY 2019-2022.
- CAMPO anticipates approximately \$10 million in TASA for the upcoming call.
- The upcoming call will use the current Project Selection Process and Criteria approved by the TPB in 2017 which includes readiness evaluation, performance measures, and cost-benefit analysis.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

CAMPO anticipates approximately \$10 million in TASA funding to be available to local sponsors for the upcoming call subject to continued federal authorization. CAMPO staff recommends TPB approval of a 2021 TASA project call so that local governments do not lose project development time while the region awaits the next comprehensive CAMPO project call in fiscal year 2022 or 2023.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

The Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act replaced the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) with a set-aside of Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program funding for Transportation Alternatives (TA). These set-aside funds include all projects and activities that were previously eligible under TAP, encompassing a variety of smaller-scale transportation projects such as pedestrian and bicycle facilities, recreational trails, safe routes to school projects, community improvements such as historic preservation and vegetation management, and environmental mitigation related to stormwater and habitat connectivity.

Given the highly sensitive environmental concerns surrounding the construction of the \$80million State Highway 45 Southwest toll road, the Central Texas Regional Mobility Authority set a goal to not only meet environmental standards for the project, but to exceed them. In designing, engineering and constructing the roadway, the project team was able to accomplish that goal.

The four-lane toll road connects two major thoroughfares in south Austin, addressing a desperate need for traffic congestion relief in the growing area. But the highway's location on the Edwards Aquifer Recharge Zone presented substantial challenges. The aquifer sustains Barton Springs, which is home to rare and endangered species and provides drinking water for the surrounding communities. The project moved forward in 2016 after 30 years of discourse between the community, environmental groups and transportation agencies.

Experts from multiple agencies spent more than 375 hours meeting to discuss environmental mitigation solutions for the project, and the Mobility Authority invested \$2 million to have an independent environmental compliance manager oversee construction.

Among the project's complex environmental requirements were that any materials generated from the site could not be hauled away, and crews had to reuse them for the project. McCarthy installed an onsite rock-crushing operation so a large number of boulders could be reused.

Environmental considerations sparked innovation in redundant water quality protection measures and resulted in a total suspended solids removal rate of 98% over the aquifer and 92% over the entire project.

Eight solar-powered water quality batch detention ponds were designed for permanent stormwater quality treatment and served as temporary sedimentation basins during construction.
