2. Approval of May 19, 2025 Meeting Summary

...... Mr. Chad McKeown, CAMPO

The Chair entertained a motion for approval of the May 19, 2025 meeting summary, as presented.

Mr. Mike Sexton, P.E. moved for approval of the May 19, 2025 meeting summary, as presented.

Mr. Ed Collins seconded the motion.

Mr. Richard Mendoza, P.E. recused himself from voting to approve the May 19, 2025 meeting summary, as presented.

The motion prevailed.

3. Update on Interchange Bottlenecks Study

The Chair recognized Mr. Will Lisska, CAMPO Regional Planning Manager presented an outline of topics to be covered in the update and introduced Ms. Leslie Pollack of HDR, Inc., consultant services provider for the Interchange Bottlenecks Study as presenter.

Ms. Pollack identified the project goals for the Interchange Bottleneck Study as follows:

- 1. Understand which intersections/interchanges are high contributors of congestion and crashes within the region
- 2. Develop a prioritized list of bottleneck locations based on factors related to congestion, safety multimodal environment, and demographics
- 3. Facilitate project readiness by advancing intersection/interchange projects towards project development (planning-level concept development)

Ms. Pollack also defined "bottleneck" as a physical condition in the transportation infrastructure leading to congestion, queueing, and/or delays. Ms. Pollack noted that safety and crashes is considered an integral part of the Interchange Bottleneck Study because crashes can have the short and long term impacts on operations in the region.

Ms. Pollack later discussed the prioritization criteria process and weighting system and noted that a statistical analysis was completed to ensure no redundancy in the prioritization criteria and weighting. Ms. Pollack reported that a list of 15 intersections/interchanges was generated following the prioritization criteria process and weighting and added that post prioritization meetings were held with stakeholders which later resulted in a recommendation to move forward with the top four (4) intersections/interchanges as follows:

- 1. SH 71/Riverside Dr. City of Austin, Travis County
- 2. IH-35/Wonder World Dr. San Marcos, Hays County
- 3. IH-35/SH80 San Marcos, Hays County
- 4. Loop 1 (MoPac)/FM 734 City of Austin, Travis County

Ms. Pollack informed the Committee that a pre-prioritization questionnaire was developed and forwarded to stakeholders. Ms. Pollack reported that eight (8) responses were received regarding bottleneck locations in their region, bottleneck issues and potential improvements for each location, and innovative intersections and what is being implemented for best practices.

Mr. Lisska concluded the update with a brief a brief discussion of the next steps. A brief question and answer with comments followed.

4. Presentation and Discussion on 2015-2024 State of Safety Report

The Chair recognized Mr. Jeff Kaufman, Texas A&M Transportation Institute who presented the region's crash data for the last ten (10) years and provided an overview of how traffic safety has changed over the decade, and how it relates to federal performance measures. Mr. Kaufman reported that crashes in the region have dropped 2.4% from 2023 and statewide crashes have decreased .9%. Mr. Kaufman informed the Committee that regional crash rates are determined by the number of crashes that occur compared to the amount of travel that occurs. Mr. Kaufman added that in comparison, the region has performed better than the state with regards to crash data.

Mr. Kaufman later presented additional regional data as follows:

- 1. Regional fatalities have dropped 4.7% from 2023
- 2. Regional fatalities are down 15.8% down from 20-year high recorded in 2022
- 3. Regional fatalities still 13.7 % higher than 10 years ago
- 4. Regional serious injuries are on downward trend from 2023
- 5. Bike/Ped Fatality and Serious Injuries (Combined to match federal performance measures) increased slightly from 2024

Mr. Kaufman briefly discussed the Road to Zero by 2050 Performance Measures adopted by CAMPO and targets based on 5-year moving averages. Mr. Kaufman reported data as of July 31, 2025 per CRIS as follows:

- 1. 175 Fatalities (143 as of 07/31/2024)
- 2. 640 Serious Injuries (791 in 2024)
- 3. 121 Bike/Ped Fatality and Serious Injuries (112 in 2024)

Mr. Kaufman concluded the presentation with a brief overview of the 17 focus areas included in the State of Safety Report. The presentation concluded without questions or comments.

5. Presentation of CAMPO Regional Safety Action Plan (RSAP)

The Chair recognized Mr. Nicholas Samuel, CAMPO Senior Regional Planner who thanked the TAC and task force members for their input and support in the development of the CAMPO RSAP. Mr. Samuel briefly discussed the RSAP's purpose, project schedule, vision, and goals. Mr. Samuel also called attention to the previous presentation on the State of Safety Report and noted its significance to the region and RSAP.

Mr. Samuel also provided a brief summary of the following:

- 1. RSAP community outreach process
- 2. Analysis results of underserved communities
- 3. Components and processes for County-level SAPs and next steps
- 4. RSAP strategy overview
- 5. Next steps (Draft RSAP review and TPB adoption timeline)

Mr. Samuel noted that TAC feedback on the RSAP are due by September 5, 2025. The presentation concluded with a brief question and answer with comments.

6. Discussion on Transportation Demand Management (TDM) Subcommittee

The Chair recognized Mr. Nirav Ved, CAMPO Data & Operations Manager who informed the Committee that the TDM Subcommittee was formed by the Transportation Policy Board (TPB) in August 2021 and regularly convened for approximately two (2) years until funding for the CAMPO TDM Program expired.

Mr. Ved reported that CAMPO received funding earlier this year from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) to continue the regional TDM Program resulting in the reformation of the TDM Subcommittee. Mr. Ved further reported that CAMPO has completed its procurement process for the TDM contract and entered an agreement with the previous consultants as the consultant services provider for TDM.

Mr. Ved later announced a request for nominations to the TDM Subcommittee and following a brief question and answer with comments, membership details of the TDM Subcommittee were provided as follows:

- 1. TDM Subcommittee Goal Provide regional guidance to CAMPO for TDM
- 2. Membership of 7-9 members; 2-year term
- 3. Membership to include TAC members and/or individuals from agencies specializing in TDM
- 4. Meeting schedule Once every 2 months
- 5. Deadline for TDM Subcommittee nominations September 2, 2025

Following additional comments, the Committee requested that a copy of the previous TDM Subcommittee membership roster be provided to the TAC. The presentation concluded without further questions or comments.

7. Report on Transportation Planning Activities

The Chair recognized Mr. Chad McKeown, CAMPO Deputy Executive Director who congratulated the TxDOT-Austin District on reconstruction of the RM 1431 Bridge at Cow Creek that was washed out due to last month's flooding. Mr. McKeown noted the impressiveness of the 29-day bridge reconstruction.

The Chair also recognized Mr. Ryan Collins, CAMPO Short-Range Planning Manager who reported that CAMPO will be developing the next iteration of the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) to be approved by the TPB next spring. Mr. Collins added that follow-up meeting will be held with project sponsors to discuss potential projects to be included in the 2027-2030 TIP.

Mr. Collins also reported that announcement of the next call for projects is tentatively scheduled for September 15, 2025 and noted that approximately \$350 million will be allocated to projects in the region. Mr. Collins further reported that two (2) meetings were held by the TPB Scoring Committee to review the scoring criteria and added that minor changes to the scoring criteria will be discussed at the Sept. 8th TPB Meeting.

The report on transportation planning activities concluded with a brief question and answer with comments.

8. TAC Chair Announcements

The Chair announced that the deadline for TAC feedback on the RSAP is September 5, 2025 and the deadline for TDM Subcommittee nominations is September 2, 2025.

The Chair also announced that the next Transportation Policy Board Meeting will be held on September 8, 2025 and the next Technical Advisory Committee Meeting will be held on September 22, 2025 at 2:00 p.m.

9. Adjournment

The subcommittee met every other month through September 2023 until federal funding dedicated to TDM expired and the region awaited approval for the use of programmed funds to continue. Those funds were not approved until March 2025.

PURPOSE AND EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Capital Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (CAMPO) is conducting community outreach for amendments to the 2025-2028 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and 2050 Regional Transportation Plan (RTP). This process includes a public hearing, 30 days of public comment, in--person and online open houses, and will conclude with direct approval by the Transportation Policy Board as detailed in both the Public Participation Plan and Amendment Policies and Procedures.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

Any projects selected for federal funding through surface transportation programs including federal highway and transit formula and discretionary programs, must be approved directly by the Transportation Policy Board through the TIP and RTP for federal funding to be obligated to projects or sponsors.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

CAMPO develops and maintains the TIP and RTP. The TIP is adopted every two years and the RTP every 5 years. In addition to adoption, the TIP and RTP are amended on a regular basis to ensure that the most current information is approved by the TPB. Sponsors may submit a request for an amendment at any time using the online application which is then processed according to the amendment policies either through a regular amendment cycle, administratively, or as an out-of-cycle amendment. The nature of the request is determined upon review of the submission and additional coordination with the project sponsors as needed.

Subject: Discussion on 2028-2031 Call for Projects

RECOMMENDATION

None. This item is for informational purposes only.

PURPOSE AND EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Capital Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (CAMPO) is preparing to issue a Call for Projects requesting applications for transportation projects within the six-county CAMPO region. This competitive process will select projects for Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG), Transportation Alternative Set-Aside (TASA), and Carbon Reduction Program (CRP) funding.

Sponsors will be asked to submit projects for consideration through the online application process. Submitted projects will be evaluated through the comprehensive multi-step process that screens projects for federal eligibility before being assessed for readiness. Eligible projects that are determined to likely be ready within fiscal years 2028 through 2031 will then be scored using CAMPO's approved project selection criteria. A program of projects and activities will be recommended to the Transportation Policy Board for funding consideration based on the resulting score, ranking, and funding availability.

Staff will provide the project call schedule, process overview, and financial forecast and associated funding amounts for allocation to the Technical Advisory Committee for discussion.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

Projects selected by the Transportation Policy Board will be programmed with federal funding currently apportioned to the region or forecast to be apportioned in future fiscal years. These amounts are estimates and not guaranteed beyond the current federal transportation bill, the Infrastructure Investments and Jobs Act (IIJA), which is currently authorized through Fiscal Year 2026. The funding forecast assumes the continued authorization of the federal programs and similar apportionment levels. Staff may recommend different funding amounts as determined by the scheduling of projects submitted, progress of currently funded projects, changes to federal funding programs and availability, and/or direction by the Transportation Policy Board.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

The Transportation Policy Board is responsible for directly allocating Transportation Alternative Set-Aside (TASA), Carbon Reduction Program (CRP), and Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) funding for transportation projects in the six-county CAMPO region. These funds are administered through a competitive, performance-based project selection process.

SUPPORTING DOCUMENTS
